

Carryover

\$385.0 M

Funds for items allocated in prior fiscal year but not received until next fiscal year.

Contingency

\$95.4 M

Funds for unexpected events or unforeseen needs during the fiscal year.

General Fund

\$595.4 M

Discretionary funds allocated based on needs and priorities of the City.

Ex: Public Safety, Parks

Trust Funds

\$157.0 M

Funds to self-insure the City for areas of liability. Ex: Employee Benefits, Workers' Comp

Enterprise Funds

\$274.1 M

Provides goods and services which are fully recovered through revenues. Ex: Utilities, Falcon Field

Construction Funds

\$482.7 M

Used to construct infrastructure and facilities, and to acquire land and equipment.

Payment of debt related to capital improvement projects.

Funds awarded by outside entities for a specific purpose.



Maintenance budget would be needed after the completion of a new road to ensure that it stays in good condition.

Downtown Mesa

Neon Garden



The Neon Garden is a multi-purpose pocket-park attached to
The Post. The space gives a new home to several restored historic neon signs, such as Bill Johnsons, Watson's Flowers, Dairy Queen, and Smiley Ford.

Restaurant Incubator



In partnership with Local First
Arizona, this commercial space
will feature a test kitchen,
commissary, and dining area
where emerging restauranteurs
can experiment, develop, and
grow their business. The
design features eight rotating
kiosks, layered seating zones,
and a generous patio that
anchors to the social life of
Main Street.

Gateway Library

The Gateway Library will have similar amenities to the Main, Red Mountain, and Dobson Ranch libraries. As a full-service library, it will provide services to residents of all ages with an emphasis on a modern library feel and the use of technology to streamline services.

Climate Action Plan

The budget includes continued funding for existing and new projects under the Mesa Climate Action Plan. These include electric vehicle charging, watershed protection, neighborhood tree planting, and LED light conversions at city sports fields.

Public Safety

The Police Department will recruit for three academies of approximately 110 recruits in total. Mesa Fire & Medical Department will host one firefighter recruit academies with up to 35 recruits.

Opening Summer 2025, the Northeast Public Safety Facility will house Fire Station 222 and a new Police Substation. Construction will begin on two new fire stations, Lehi (Station 223) and Hawes Crossing (Station 224).

The Emergency Transport Program is now fully built-out to serve city-wide ambulance service with the addition of 59 positions and 7 ambulances.


