Pimas have many achievements. One achievement is how the Pimas have created a wooden carrier called a Cradleboard. A cradle board is like a stroller that goes on your back with no wheels. Also 50%+ of Pimas that are 35+ years old have **Diabetes**. They have also preserved their name when they were alive. It is Tohono O'odham.

Their economy was very good. The Pimas gave crops and plants to **immigrants**, soldiers, and settlers, but as immigrants sailed to America, it **deprived** the Pimas of their water. This was because they were on the path to get to Sonora, Mexico. They were all rushing to get there because gold was found there. Despite some of the tribe being in Mexico, they have some **economic ties** to the US. They both incorporated wheat as a staple crop and adopted the Mexican technique of farming with check beds, or border irrigation.
