Recommendation Highlights

- Reiterate in *Use of Force Policy*:
 - Subjects who have been exposed to a Conducted Energy Weapon application receive a medical evaluation by:
 - Emergency medical responders or;
 - At a medical facility

PERF makes note that this information is in the *Conducted Energy Weapon Policy*, but suggests it also be placed in the general *Use of Force Policy*.

Gap Analysis

- PERF Recommendation

Include specific information reference medical evaluation after TASER application in the general Use of Force Policy.

- Current Policy

- This is mentioned in one policy but not in the Use of Force policy.
- Use of Force policy does reference medical treatment, but it has a different meaning than PERF's recommendation.



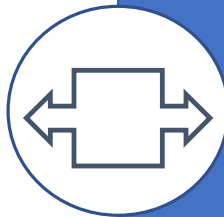
Pros and Cons (Discussion Points)

*Reasons **to** adapt the recommendation*

- We agree individuals who have received an CEW deployment should be afforded medical evaluation and this should be in policy.
- The expanded policy will remove the officer's interpretation of "Ensure medical treatment is provided when appropriate."
- If something is mission critical, it is worth repeating (or at least including in two separate policies).

*Reasons **against** adopting the recommendation*

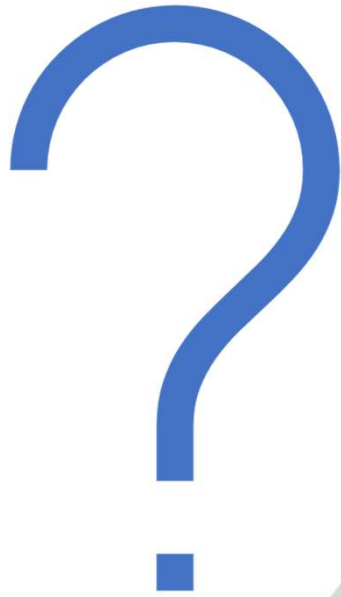
- No objection by committee related modifying policy
